Tartan.

Colourful Scottish tartans are favourite designs in many countries.

The tartan developed chiefly in the Highlands of Scotland. Scottish literature first referred to it way back in the thirteenth century and since then, "Tartan" has established itself as a beautiful and prestigious design.

The "Tartan" design consists of stripes of various widths and colours the stripes cross at right angles against a solid colour background, resulting in a pattern that's as distinguished as its historical significance, when each clan and family designed its own pattern.

Just like the 'Tartan' of yore, our school magazine 'Tartan' encompasses glimpses of the manifold curricular and co-curricular activities of our school and the creative talents of our children who come from different cultural backgrounds that blend harmoniously to create the Bombay Scottish School Tartan.



THE SCHOOL SHIELD AND CREST

The school shield represents the 'Cross of St. Andrew' the patron saint of Scotland. The white 'Crux decussata' (cross) quarters the shield into four segments each representing a house denoted by the Fleur-De-Lis, the Castle, the Lion and the Palm Tree.

OUR MOTTO

Perseverantia Et Fide in Deo. These are Latin words. They mean 'Perseverance and Faith in God'. They are two qualities which personify the Scottish character. Scottish expects that every Scottishite will do his duty and endeavour to achieve success in life by means of honest and strenu ous effort, putting full faith in God.

THE SCHOOL FLAG

The School flag is sky-blue in colour. It bears the 'Crux decussata' or the Cross of St. Andrew. Although never officially adopted, the St. Andrew Saltire (cross) became the emblem of Scotland and has been flown for hundreds of years. It was incorporated in the Union Jack that became the British National Flag after the union of England and Scotland in 1707. St. Andrew was a fisherman and brother of Simon Peter. At first, he was a disciple of John the Baptist. He brought to Jesus the boy from whose lunch



the Lord produced enough to feed a crowd of five thousand. Jesus later made Andrew his first apostle and promised to make him a "Fisher of Men".

Andrew was crucified on an X-shaped cross called the 'Crux decussata'. He became the patron saint of Scotland as early as the eighth century. St. Andrew's Feast Day is celebrated on 30th November. Funds collected on St. Andrew's Day were donated to the orphans of Bombay Scottish. These funds came from all over India and even from abroad. It is the sacred duty of every Scottishite to keep the flag flying.

THE SCHOOL HOUSE SYSTEM

The house system was introduced in 1921. The boys' houses are named after Scottish missionaries who were

As a Member of the Committee of Management of the Bombay Scottish Orphanage Society, his constant work and dedication to the school makes him an epitome and an inspiration for all of us.


















19 students scored between 70% and 79%



Report on Khopoli - Durshet Forest Trail

A Class trip was organized by the school for the students of Std VIII on 6th and 7th March 2014.

In the evening, they were given a task of preparing a skit where the story revolved around a tribal King and Queen. The students undertook this task with great enthusiasm especially when making their props from waste material. Dinner was followed by a campfire and DJ session and this was thoroughly enjoyed by both students and teachers. They visited a tribal village. Our students immediately organized a collection to facilitate the building of compound wall for the local school. Gift articles and stationery items were given to the local school children.

Student also visited some homes of the tribals and interested with them, thus getting some basic understanding of their lifestyle.

Thus the trip was an eye-opener for our students as they had a first-hand experience of the simple and hard life led by the tribals. They were moved by the tough and pathetic conditions in which the locals lived their lives. There were no health care facilities and they suffered acute poverty with practically no means to acquire basic necessities.

Students learnt to adjust themselves to a Spartan lifestyle, ie living together in dormitories with basic necessities only and eating simple food. The activities conducted by the organizers fostered mutual co-operation. Team spirit and concepts of time management. The students enthusiastically participated in all the activities conducted, in a most disciplined manner.

Such trips will always be welcomed by students and will develop in them, a better understanding of human beings privileged than them and of humanity in general.

AN AMAZING WOMAN - MY GRANDMOTHER



My maternal Grandmother suffers from paralysis and is confined to a wheelchair. But it doesn't end there. She also has Alzheimer's. The combination of the two is deadly and, it

pains me to see her in this way. She had both of these disabilities before I was born so my earliest memories of her aren't different or better in any way.

She seemed rather scary to me when I was a child. To a young boy, anything without life seems ghastly and unnatural. I used to avoid her at all costs. As I grew older, curiosity got the better of me and I began to observe her, only to realize that she did nothing at all. A recurrent question in my mind was how she became this strange, preternatural (in my opinion) being.

Whenever I questioned one of my older relatives, they told me she was a great commando who had injured herself in action. I never believed them and ended up guessing that she had some sort of sports accident. The only thing I knew for sure was that the paralysis had happened when my mother was just a child, but the Alzheimer's came two years before I was born. I saw the occasional picture of her in a wheelchair (post the paralysis but before the onset of Alzheimer's) but even then she had a serious no-nonsense expression on her face. I envisioned her as a strict headmistress, who had fallen down the stairs or something like that.

I am not a housework (or any kind of work, for that matter) loving person and would rather do nothing but play, watch T.V and sleep (here I exaggerate but I'm sure the average teenager can relate). Nevertheless, my workhorse father insisted that we all (my siblings, my maternal cousins and I) clean up my maternal grandparents' house. My father believes in division of labour and a first-comefirst-get principle of choice. I came first and chose the task of cleaning my grandmother's cupboard (that being the easiest and fastest job).

Nevertheless, I accepted my task reluctantly and grudgingly (I hate housework). I took up a duster and began. It was terribly dusty and reminded me of my paternal grandfather's (very, very old) stack of comic books, which



I had read when I was very bored and wanted to annoy my sister (the dust on the pages made me sneeze, and a sneezing brother is every sister's nightmare, according to my sister). I began sneezing and only managed to stop myself when I ran away. I came back armed with a handkerchief (held over my nose) and began to clean the cupboard.

It was stuffed with clothes and mothballs. I decided to empty it out, clean it, and put the contents back in. then I saw it. It was a very, very old metal box with a latch and a lock. I immediately began searching for the key, only to realize it was already in the lock. So I opened the box.

Attached to it was a military report. My grandmother had served in Afghanistan. The military report commended her for her bravery, great tactical intelligence and sense of duty. I was stunned. It ended with a paragraph on how she had sacrificed the use of her limbs (a bullet to the spinal cord) while saving her comrades. There was also a medical report which diagnosed her with trauma.

After reading all of this there were tears in my eyes. My thoughts kept returning to how thoughtless and insensitive I had been, to how I had discredited anything that made her seem great, to how I had always avoided her and thought her a bore. The frown and the expression was a result of trauma and troubled memories.

She was a hero!!

Ever since that day I have tried to take as much care of her

as possible. Her Alzheimer's has also begun to improve. And now when I look at her and smile, I can almost see a smile on her face as well, and a twinkle in her eyes!







Having both parents in a child's upbringing is necessary for a healthier upbringing and lifestyle. Both parents provide a certain type of nurturing that cannot be



Similarly, sadness is construed as the lack of happiness. Children tend to live in cocoons and become oblivious to both the small things that matter in life, like family and friends, as well as the big things which affect our lives like social evils and inequalities.

Happiness to me is to be with the people who matter most to me. These are people with whom I can be myself and people who make me feel wanted. Happiness to me is to watch my favourite television show with my brothers and parents over the weekend. It might seem unusual coming from a teenager's point of view but I feel genuinely happy to have my family around. I feel lucky to be part of a family where, not for a moment have I ever felt that I am treated differently vis-a-vis my brothers. I say this because I see that even in well to do and educated families the boy seems to have a more "privileged position."

When I pick up the newspaper, it is jam-packed with stories about the abuse of women. The entire country was shaken up following the heinous incident in the nation's capital late last year. However, nothing has changed since then. On the contrary we seem to be hearing of more and more of such cases including the recent case of the young journalist in our very own city. Add to this, cases of female foeticide, infanticide, discrimination against girls and dowry deaths which really makes me wonder, what is wrong with our society? The sheer inhumanness of these acts sickens me and makes me want to ask, what's wrong in being a girl or woman? Do we want to live in a country without women?

Last year I was watching the television programme 'Satyamev Jayate'. It was an episode which dealt with the issue of female foeticide. I was horrified by the experiences narrated by mothers who had either given birth to a female child or were carrying a female child. I will not go into details but the brutality of the acts for the 'crime' of giving birth to a female child disturbed me to my very core. It was only after this that I started noticing the subtle differences in the treatment of boys and girls even amongst families that we know. That day I vowed to do my own two bits to change the position of

girls in our society.

The person who has made the biggest impact on me is Sheela, a simple lady who comes to our house for my mother's head massage. She is from a village in Uttar Pradesh and was married off at the age of fifteen. By the time she was twenty she was the mother of two boys and a girl. She is not well educated. With the meagre income that she and her husband earn, she could only afford to send one child to a private school. She decided to send her daughter to a private school because the daughter was brighter than her brothers. That day I learned a momentuous lesson. You have to be progressive in thought and spirit. It doesn't matter which class of society you belong to, that isn't what truly defines you. I salute the spirit and courage of Sheela against daunting odds. May a million Sheelas bloom! May all the girls in our country get the same love, respect and opportunities that are given to boys.
