# A Tartan Tale of Pore

Colourful Scottish Tartans are favourite designs in many countries. The tartan developed chiefly in the Highlands of Scotland. Scottish literature first referred to it way back in the thirteenth century and since then, the 'Tartan' has established itself as a beautiful and prestigious design.

The 'Tartan' design consists of stripes of various widths and colours. The stripes cross at right angles against a solid colour background, resulting in a pattern that's as distinguished as its historical significance, when each clan and family designed its own pattern.

Just like the 'Tartan' of long ago, our School magazine
'Tartan' encompasses glimpses of the manifold curricular
and co-curricular activities of
our School and the creative talents of
our children who come from different cultural
backgrounds that blend harmoniously to create the
Bombay Scottish School Tartan.



#### THE SCHOOL SHIELD AND CREST

The School Shield represents the 'Cross of St. Andrew', the patron saint of Scotland. The white 'Crux Decussata' (cross) quarters the shield into four segments each representing a house denoted by Fluer - De - Lis, the Scottish Castle and the Lion and the Palm Tree.

#### **OUR MOTTO**

Perseverantia Et Fide in Deo. These Latin words mean 'Perseverance and Faith in God'. They are two qualities which personify the Scottish character. Bombay Scottish expects every Scottishite to do his duty and endeavour to achieve success in life by means of honest and strenuous effort, putting complete faith in God.

#### THE SCHOOL FLAG

The School flag is sky blue in colour. It bears the 'Crux Decussata' or the Cross of St. Andrew. Although never officially adopted, the St. Andrew Saltire (cross) became the emblem of Scotland and has been flown for hundreds of years. It was incorporated in the Union Jack that became the British National Flag after the union of England and Scotland in 1707. St. Andrew was a fisherman and brother of Simon Peter. At first, he was a disciple of John the Baptist. He brought to Jesus the boy from whose lunch the Lord produced enough to feed a crowd of five thousand. Jesus later made Andrew his first apostle and promised to make him a 'Fisher of Men'. Andrew was crucified on an X – shaped cross called the 'Crux Decussata'. He became the patron saint of Scotland as early as the eighth century.

St. Andrew's Feast Day is celebrated on 30<sup>th</sup> November. Funds collected on St. Andrew's Day were donated to the orphans of Bombay Scottish. These funds came from abroad. It is the sacred duty of every Scottishite to keep the flag flying high.

#### THE SCHOOL HOUSE SYSTEM

The House System was introduced in 1921. The Boy's Houses are named after Scottish Missionaries who were closely associated with the Orphanage; they include: Haddow, Kennedy, MacPherson and MacGregor. The Girl's Houses are named after the Scottish Queens: Anne, Victoria, Catherine and Elizabeth.

#### THE SCHOOL

The School, established in June 1997, has completed twenty-four years. Without the continuous providence and grace of the Almighty, this would not have been possible. When the pandemic put the whole world into lockdown, the School's shift from offline to online mode, in particular, was remarkable. #### **NEW ACADEMIC YEAR: 2020 - 2021**


Percentage-wise Break-up of ICSE -2021 BSS-Powai Results {English + Best of 4}









































#### SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY

## **BEYONDARIES: GLOBAL SCHOLARS (GRADE 7)**

Global Scholars is a worldwide digital exchange programme that connects students of ages 10 to 13 in centres around the world. Guided by their educators, the students partake in a project-based curriculum and engage with multicultural peers in an e-classroom, to amplify global competency. Throughout the year, students, who were part of Global Scholars, collaborated with their peers across the globe, for a myriad of digital schemes - recycling videos, a website for boosting green energy and the like. The activities of the programme mostly took two hours of instructional time each week. All five units were explicitly composed for specific objectives - Introduction to Global Scholars, everyday Consumption, Sustainable City Connections, Sharing Global Resources and Community Action Project. These units helped students recognize culture, take perspective, communicate respectfully, and work as a team. Students also met up with their peers from places like Madrid, Spain, and Florida, USA through virtual platforms. The international outlook equipped students to interact on distinct views on every conceivable subject - from traditional cuisines to the imminent threatening climate catastrophe on Earth. Each week, students communicated through e-classrooms with their peers across the globe, completed in-class activities and posted their opinions and study on the e-classroom forums. Global Scholars commissioned the students with an appreciation for heterogeneity, aesthetic perception, global awareness, and global engagement, along with customary learning outcomes that support global training and maturity across scholastic subjects (digital refinement, language interface, self-efficacy, erudite engagement, and analytical reasoning).

### NATIONAL CELEBRATIONS A) INDEPENDENCE DAY

The National flag was hoisted by our Principal, Ms J Kotian, along with a few staff members, on the school premises. This was followed by a prayer service. An online prayer service was held for all the other teachers. The class teachers conducted a prayer service for their students

#### **VALEDICTORY CEREMONY**



Students used their creativity and completed their activity with a lot of enthusiasm.
Literary Club	The Literary Club steered from the traditional conventions of performance due to ar online medium of education. 25 students of the Club actively contributed to this club in the two activities presented in Term 1 and Term 2, respectively. A debriefing prior to the actual activities was conducted where students formed groups, brainstormed and actively participated in the proceedings. Students were introduced to a new form of theatre called 'The Reader's Theatre' where they were exposed to two scripts, both as members of the audience and the acting crew. Students learned a lot from each other owing to the mixed group of Grades 6 to 8. Furthermore, the Literary Club enabled students to push the boundaries and add twists to original tales. They were permitted to alter the setting, plot, characters, dialogues and the like. This activity taught students to collaborate and enhance their writing skills. Each activity was thoroughly enjoyed and this novel experience was taken up with utmost seriousness resulting in flawless execution of both the activities.
STEM Club	In their first session held on 21st September 2020, the students of Grade 6 were introduced to interactive learning material using H5P.org. They came up with creative ideas to make flashcards on the free website. After completing their task, a Google Form was shared for students to paste the link of the material they had created using the website. Students of Grades 7 and 8 were introduced to the science of coding through App Designing, using MIT App Inventor. They were guided through the process of designing the 'Text To Speech' App, wherein whatever is typed in the textbox is read aloud by the app. Students designed and built the app using basic coding blocks with components from the given palette.
	The second session, which was conducted for Grade 6 on 11th January 2021, introduced students to a website called Tinkercad. They learnt basic functions of the website and a sample design. They then created an original 3D design of an object or cartoon enthusiastically.

	In the second session conducted for the students of Grades 7 and 8 on 9th December 2020 and 11th December 2020, students learnt the nuances of GIF creation. They learnt how to make a customised GIFs of their name. In addition to this, they also learnt how to make a GIF using ready images of a bird flying sequence. Students uploaded their creations to a Google form.
Nature Club	For their Term 1 activity, students prepared a junk model based on the theme - 'Conservation of Nature'. They used only recyclable materials like old newspapers, egg boxes, cardboard, plastic, cans, old toys, boxes, tetra packs, fabrics, caps of bottles, cartons and the like to do so. The model had to be accompanied by a suitable slogan or poem. After a week of preparations, on 21st September 2020, students of Grades 6 to 8 displayed their innovative models. They explained the working of their models as well as the 3Rs while also stating the methods of conservation in the present times.  For their Term 2 activity, students were given a link along with a tutorial to help them learn how to make online posters. On 8th January 2021, students made online posters on the topic (given on the spot) - 'Endangered Species' using Spark Adobe. They had to choose one endangered animal and create a poster project introducing the animal, its situation

The session ended with students actively taking a quiz. The activity invoke a sense of pride among the students for their city, Mumbai.

The Club meetings were conducted every Wednesday from 1:00 p.m. to 1:45 p.m. Elevents sessions were conducted throughout the academic year wherein each session provided students with a unique learning experience. They honed their oratory skills by active participating in - Just A Minute, Extempore, Impromptu, Mock Debate and Debates various topics that were planned and instantaneous. Apart from the above, an engaging enlightening and interactive session was conducted by student facilitators, Tarun Parand Sanjana Pillai, who guided students through the WSDS format. Mock debates similar lines were conducted. Breakout rooms were used for this purpose. The session were thoroughly enjoyed by the students as well as the facilitators.

Students, who were divided into groups, engaged in different adventure activities which included community service in the village, caving, low rope course, high rope course, strawberry plucking and rappelling. #### PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION (PTA)

- The PTA assisted the parents in getting text-books from the bookstore through continuous follow ups, during the lockdown period.
- They met to bring relief to the ones providing bus service to the School, an endeavour that would be taken up by the new EC of the PTA.
- The PTA helped to maintain a constant and quick channel of communication between the School and parent community.
- The Sports Committee conducted on-line coaching for basketball and football for interested students.

- On the occasion of Teacher's Day, Class Representatives of the primary section collected cards from students and compiled videos to wish the teachers.
- The PTA hosted a Webinar on 'Coding and Artificial Intelligence' on 10th October, for students of Grades 3-10. Ms. Vidusha Daga was the resource person.
- A webinar to higlight and compare the various boards was conducted for the parents of Grade 10 students. It was hosted by the PTA and was conducted by Ms. Ranjani Krishnan and Counsellor, Ms. Ritu Wason on 25th September 2020.
- A GBM of the PTA was conducted on 23rd December 2020. At this meeting, parents verbally appreciated the Management's decision of not increasing the school fees due to the financial distress brought about by the pandemic.

In addition to this, the School also organized meetings between the Coordinators, School Counsellors, and the parents of the students who needed help to reach the required milestones in their curriculum/ socially acceptable behaviour.

Academic reviews for students, who had not fared well in the Assessments, were conducted to brief the parent-child about the gap in academic achievement. The School devised effective strategies to help the child excel using remedial help from the school teachers who helped them identify their learning goals and put in place study plans to achieve during the term, along with time management techniques.

This year proved to be an acid test for our commitment and resilience but we have emerged successful in providing a range of opportunities to meet the whole spectrum of our student community. Take a look at this picture. This is the **Choluteca Bridge of Honduras**, built in 1930 and later rebuilt in 1996. I am sure that the question plaguing your mind right now is - Why is the bridge built away from the river and not across it? How foolish of someone to have built this bridge in the first place?

Let me tell you more about this bridge. The Honduras government, knowing that the bridge in this area was likely to face extreme weather conditions, commissioned some of the best architectural minds in the world to build a bridge that could withstand any hurricane. Sure enough, in 1998, Honduras was hit by Hurricane Mitch, a category 5 storm that devastated the Caribbean. Honduras was wrecked. Roads were wiped out, there was considerable damage to buildings and every other bridge in Honduras was destroyed except for the Choluteca Bridge, which stood its ground and survived in near perfect condition.

It was an amazing architectural achievement. Or, at least it should have been. Even though the bridge had stood its ground, the storm had caused the river to carve a completely new path and it no longer ran under the bridge, thus rendering the bridge essentially useless.




This club brings the students together to develop leadership skills while discovering the power of 'Service Above Self'. It reaches out to the community for various causes.

## **Social Constructionism**

By definition, social constructionism means a notion, or connotation of an object or event by society, and adopted by the inhabitants of that society with respect to how they view or deal with the object or event. Constructionism is something that a group in society has constructed. It is something that is created socially but happens because society supports it and encourages it to occur. It is something that has been created at some point, but may be considered a social norm now. It attaches a label to the different categories of people in a society.

The social constructionism perspective says that we never know what universal true or false is, what is good or bad,

Personalities like Whoopi Goldberg, Justin Timberlake, Daniel Radcliffe, who suffered from dyslexia, have proved it all. Since not many of us can perform like them, are we disabled?

Coming to the constructionism of gender, people start to learn what is right and wrong, according to society, from the time they are born. Boys are gifted monster trucks, race cars, and action hero type toys while girls are gifted dolls, cute dresses, and stuffed teddy bears. Where does the notion of blue for boys and pink for girls come from? Where did the ideas that boys do not cry or girls should play with dolls come from? Such gender socialization is done before a child is even born.

Apart from this, we have even created a reality where success is distinguished for the different categories of professions. We have actually constructed a reality where academic intelligence is real intelligence. We have created a world where excellence in academic intelligence leads you to a good job and good earning thereby associating money with success. play their character. Dressed in character, these children would give the real characters a run for their money! The authors looked composed and were equally geared up to tackle any situation.



That's when we teachers can claim that we have actually touched a few minds in the teaching-learning process.
